

Small Community Restores West Galveston Habitat

Bay Harbor is quiet and relatively small. It was originally a fishing community located on the bay side of the west end of Galveston Island, three miles east of San Luis Pass. With the need to provide boater access into the bay, the Bay Harbor Habitat Restoration Project began as a typical maintenance dredging project. Guidance from the US Fish & Wildlife Service and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration changed the dredging to a habitat restoration and beneficial use project eligible for agency matching funds. The community took on this environmental project to restore bayside habitat and increase opportunities for the community's popular recreational activities of birding, fishing, and boating.

The project began in August 2006 filing an application for matching funds to the Coastal Erosion Planning and Response Act (CEPRA Cycle 5). From there the project took shape with the hiring of Gahagan & Bryant & Associates engineering who provided the needed description of the project and cost estimates. The north side of the eroding island became the one-acre pad rising four feet and extending to four acres of intertidal sheltered emergent marsh and bird nesting habitat. GBA provided surveys and permit application to the Army Corps of Engineers and Texas General Land Office. The contractor, JND Thomas Company dredged the existing channel a distance of 3,800 feet and installed 600 linear feet of Geotube® to protect the newly dredged channel and island pad from erosion. 15,000 cubic yards of material were recovered and used to fill the Geotubes® and raise elevations to protect up to eight additional acres behind the structure for future habitat creation.

To accomplish this costly project, the communities had fundraising events, block captain parties, sold t-shirts, cups, caps, a Fishing Rodeo, and solicited donations. Information on the project was provided through its newsletter, a printed brochure, e-mail, and a project progress board at the marina. Applications for matching funds were submitted to a list of agencies provided by NOAA. Bay Harbor's project was awarded grants from US Fish & Wildlife, NOAA, Galveston Bay Foundation, the National Fish & Wildlife Foundation, National Association of Counties, and Restore America's Estuaries. The Bay Harbor Habitat Restoration project also received wonderful support from Texas Parks & Wildlife, Galveston County, West Galveston Island Property Owners Association, and the Texas General Land Office. Coastal Beach & Bay Foundation, President Jeri Kinnear served as our financial administrator handling all grants and donations.

GBA officially declared the project completed as of December 21, 2010. On February 26, 2011, the Galveston Bay Foundation and NRG Energy coordinated native vegetation planting with Bay Harbor residents and over 25 Boy Scouts to participate. A second planting was held on March 8th with GBF, NRG, USF&W and over 60 students from Michigan, Illinois, Indiana and Missouri participated in the planting under an "Alternate Spring Break Program".

USF&W periodic monitoring shows encouraging increases of migratory birds. The vegetation has suffered from storms and high tides but should show signs of recovery come spring. Some of the commercial fishery species expected to benefit from this project include brown and pink shrimp (Farfantepenaeus aztecus and F. duroraum), white shrimp (Litopenaeus setiferus), black drum(Pogonias cromis), southern flounder (Paralichthys lethostigma), sheepshead (Archosargus probatocephalus), eastern oysters (Crassostrea virginica), blue crab (Callinectes sapidus), red drum (Sciaenops occellatus) and spotted seatrout (Cynoscion nebulosus). Additionally, mullet (Mugil sp.) and Atlantic croaker (Micropogonias undulates) are valuable finfish species used as bait by recreation fishermen. The long-term goal is to see an increase return of bait fish to attract these sport fish. The additional elevation is to encourage bird nesting and migratory return of local and transient wildlife.

An aerial photograph provided by LightHawk outlines the increased area compared to the eroding island at the start of the project. The residents are aware that the island is fragile and must be protected from human traffic to allow birds and fishery to return for nesting. The community looks forward to more boating activity with the open access channel. The completion of this project will provide better opportunities for the public to participate in recreational fishing, birding and water sport activities in the West Galveston Bay for years to come. Making beneficial use of materials has limited impact on the environment but results in a tremendous benefit to the public. Bird Island 1954-2012 and Beyond

Summer is just around the corner, and those boat owners who are also members of BHIA will be cruising out the channel and past our very own Bird Island soon, if they haven't done so already. As a community we continue to express our gratitude for the individual volunteers and various organizations who were instrumental in preserving, expanding and deepening our channel, and in creating Bird Island. This was a Herculean effort, and has increased the viability of our community in so many ways.

you haven't done so yet, catch the aerial view on Google Earth. Then, in the upper left hand corner, slide the selector bar back and forth to view the island (and your lot for that matter) at any time from 1954 to the present. The most obvious change is from right after Hurricane Ike to the present. The island is at least eight times larger, and the channel is now clearly visible.

But the same forces of winds and waves that affected the bay before are still in play. At some point we will need to re-dredge the channel, although it will be a maintenance operation as opposed to the massive effort of 2006 to 2011. And to keep the island intact, at a minimum, we will all need to keep off it, especially during nesting season. Already, we have had some minor erosion around the geo tubes. So with the assistance of the Galveston Bay Foundation, we are beginning to consider ways to protect the island and foster even more sand and plant retention.

Their idea, which is being explored at present, is to install some reef balls in the affected areas. Like you, I couldn't imagine what this device was, but the accompanying picture tells the story: perforated concrete spheres about 4' in diameter. Environmental experts are enthusiastic about these devices. They stop erosion and the underwater openings create a great fish

nursery and habitat. They are carefully placed so as not to impeded navigation. Our focus will also be on placing the reef balls in the geo tube gaps, to help reduce erosion and hopefully allow more marsh grass to take root in those areas.

So watch The Heron for an update, and feel free to make a contribution if you can. More details as they become available. Safe Boating!

Bay Harbor Spring 2012 Fishing Report by Capt. Bill Hand

Due to the lack of a "winter", the transition of winter to spring fishing did not change much this year. Most of the fish like Speckled Trout and Redfish that spend the winter in the bay did not move too far from their summer homes. Fishing has been great all winter and that is continuing into the spring which considering we are in early May seems more like summer already!



The canals and the bay are loaded with Menhaden which have fattened up the Specks and Reds. Most of the fish are very healthy and look like a football because they have plenty to eat. If you are fishing the canals at night, you need to "match the hatch" which means that whatever you are using for bait looks like what the fish are feeding on and is about the same size and color. It is also critical that you are fishing when the feeding starts, because they fill up fast once the bite starts. Compare notes with your neighbors to determine best fishing times.

I have heard a lot of good reports over the past few weeks from our end of the bay. Most of these reports are coming from less than three miles from Bay Harbor. Live shrimp is almost always a sure thing this time of year. It is hard for a Speck or Red to turn down an active shrimp flipping around under a popping cork. The next best thing to live shrimp is the three inch Gulp shrimp tail.

My favorite color is "New Penny" fished about 18 inches under a Cajun Thunder rattling popping cork. I have caught just about every type of fish that swims in the bay on Gulp baits.

As soon as we get some good SE wind for a few days to clear up the surf, get ready; because the water temperature is perfect for things to break wide open on the beach.

We will be looking for many of you at our Annual Bay Harbor Fishing Rodeo on Saturday May 26, 2012. This is always a laid back family event and is great fun for the kids and adults as well.
