What do I feed martins to attract them?


Nothing! Purple Martins eat only flying insects. They will not come to your feeder, bird bath or fountain. They eat and drink water on the fly.

How high should the house be?

From 10 to 12 feet high and martins will take residence. Many years ago it was believed that the pole should be at least 18 to 25 feet high. The ideal situation is to have it high enough for the birds to be comfortable but low enough for us to enjoy them. There have been cases where a house was only five feet off the ground and had plenty of martins. Our pole will extend 12 feet and telescope down to five feet for easy cleaning and maintenance.

I had birds a few years ago, but they don't seem to be coming around anymore. Are there as many martins as before?

Yes, even more. Possibly you have a wooden or plastic house, because of the heat factor, the birds favor the cooler aluminum house. The characteristics of aluminum cause heat to dissipate, which keeps the compartments cooler. Many people associate metal houses with steel in a car body. The alternator in your automobile is made of aluminum, which protects the electronic components from the heat. Wood is an insulator and absorbs rays of the sun, making the house very hot during the long summer. The survival rate is much better in aluminum houses versus wooden structures. The lack of martin activity around your house may be from trees growing too close to the house.

Well, probably more information than you wanted but hearing and watching Martins swoop near the ground eating mosquitoes is very enjoyable.

Bay Harbor Spring 2014 Fishing Report by Capt. Bill Hand

It looks like spring has finally arrived in West Bay following one of the coldest and windy winters we have had down here in a long time. The spring winds are hanging in longer than most of us would like, but the water temperature is getting right with each passing day of more sunlight.



The canals are full of small Shad (Menhaden/Pogies). There is also a good hatch of small shrimp in the canals, which will move into the bay and attract schools of Specks and Reds. Now is the time to start scanning the horizon for working birds homing in on the new hatch of small bait fish and shrimp. If early fishing is any indication of things to come, we are in for another crop of large Gafftop in the two to five pound range. They are fun to catch and some people consider them to be prime table fare. Be careful handling them, because they can cause you a trip to the emergency room if you get stabbed with one of their toxic sharp fins.

There have been some good reports and photos of catches of Specks and Reds showing up during the past few weeks. I fished earlier this week and caught some nice Specks and more Gafftop than I wanted to deal with. I could not find any Redfish, but I know they are out there somewhere.

You can't catch them if you don't get out there with them. I have never caught a Speck or Red setting in my easy chair watching TV or outside doing yard work. Good luck and be careful out there.

So said Scott Williams of The United States Fish and Wildlife Service. His sentiments are echoed by Colleen Roco of The Texas General Land Office and our friend Philip Smith of The Galveston Bay Foundation. Everybody here in Bay Harbor can take some credit. Whether you participated in planting marsh grass or contributed to the project itself, we can all be proud of the result.

As Heather Young of the national Oceanic and atmospheric Administration observed: "Thanks guys for seeing the initial problem and taking action to fix it. You guys are awesome."


