#### Seagrass returning to West Galveston Bay!

One of the more exciting bits of news on the ecological front is the rapid "regrassification" of our bay! I'm not an expert in the field, and my knowledge of the subject is limited to personal observations, a couple of phone conversations with TP&W biologists, and reading a few technical articles on the subject (I was a Marine Biology major at TAMU Galveston before I switched majors, back in the Dark Ages!)

The seagrass beds I'm referring to are those that live in the water column, and rooted in the muddy or sandy bay bottom, usually along shorelines in shallow water (I'm not talking about the Spartina marsh grasses that we planted on our island and that line our undeveloped bay shore). The seagrasses that live in Galveston Bay are known as shoal grass, widgeon grass, and turtle grass. Widgeon grass likes brackish waters and was originally present in areas around Clear Lake and upper Trinity Bay. I am unaware if any of these grass beds are rebounding. However, seagrass is becoming widespread in many areas of West Galveston Bay. This seagrass is shoal grass, and it is currently overspreading many areas that are consistent with it's distribution in the 1950's, as known from the historical record (see map). Bulkheading, non-point source pollution, canal dredging and spoil placement over the grass, as well as natural events such as Hurricane Carla in 1961, led to a rapid decline in the seagrass in the 1960's and 1970's. So for nearly forty years, Galveston Bay system seagrass was limited to shoal grass and turtle grass in Christmas Bay, as well as a few scattered areas of shoal grass in areas such as Dana Cove near Pirates Beach. In other words, at least 95% of the original seagrass distribution in the Galveston Bay system has been absent for a very long time.

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

#### Bay Harbor Fall 2012 Fishing Report by Capt. Bill Hand

Fall fishing is in full swing with great catches of Specks, Reds and Sand Trout. With the passing of a couple of cold fronts the water temperature in West Bay has fallen to around 75 degrees. A drop in water temperature usually really activates the fish and starts the movement of shrimp out of the marshes. So far the bird action in the bay has been slow, but that could change any minute. Now is the time to have those binoculars in the boat and scan the horizon for diving gulls. Sometimes they are very low on the water and difficult to see with the naked eye. Another thing to check out this time of year is diving pelicans. Many times you will find a school of big Redfish under them feeding on Menhaden. Once the wind from a north slows down, the colder water will start to clear rapidly. Some-





times this takes only a few hours. Cold water clears very fast. A couple of weeks ago we caught two Bull Reds under diving pelicans near our entrance channel to Bay Harbor. Live shrimp has been working well when available, but three inch Gulp shrimp tails are hard to beat if you can't get live shrimp. In fact I think they work as well as shrimp if you know how to use them. My favorite Gulp bait is the "New Penny" and "Pearl White" 3 inch shrimp tail. They cost about the same as live shrimp, but you don't have to worry about the trash fish eating your expensive live shrimp.

The beach front has also been hot this fall when the conditions get right. There have been some really big surf run Specks caught in the Bay Harbor - Terramar area. Most of the folks catching those are using live mullet caught right there in the surf. It has not been unusual for most folks to catch their limit of Reds on any good day. That beach action should continue through early December or beyond based on what the weather does. The action on Bull Whiting should continue after the water coals even more.



Along with the good fall fishing, comes the risk of hypothermia in the cooler water. Most people think that our water is warm enough so that hypothermia is not a hazard. Check out the chart below and that myth will be dispelled.

#### Seagrass, con't.

Your tax dollars have been spent trying to re-establish the seagrass beds, mainly in areas behind Galveston Island State Park. The early reports were that the attempts to plant the grass were resulting in only very limited success. But Mother Nature, in just the last couple of years, perhaps with the help of the planting efforts, has begun to restore the seagrass beds in many areas across Galveston Bay. On the north shore of West Galveston Bay, from Alligator Point to Greens Cut and beyond, there are several miles of new seagrass beds that have re-established all on their own, perhaps helped by sprigs breaking off from plantings across the bay at Galveston Island State Park. On the south shore of the Bay, from east of Dana Dove westward through the cove behind Snake island, and further west to within a couple miles of San Luis Pass, new seagrass beds are rapidly spreading. Hopefully our own cove between our neighborhood and Terramar will soon be sporting its own seagrass! It goes without saying that these new seagrass beds provide excellent cover and habitat for numerous species that reside in our bay system. They also tend to filter sediment from the water, improving water clarity in the bay. In addition, they can halt the erosional processes that have become prevalent along our marshy shorelines (another separate project that we've spent lots of money on--think geotubes, reef balls, etc. that have been emplaced across much of our bay system).


I believe that the "regrassification" is only good news for our ecosystem, and probably reflects a healthier bay system, as a result of the extra care given to our bay over the last few decades by both citizens groups and governmental agencies. That being said, we need to make sure that everyone is aware of our improving bay system, and takes steps to protect the seagrasses. Fisherman should avoid anchoring in seagrass beds, except perhaps with a power pole, and all boaters and jet skiers should avoid scarring the bay bottoms along the very shallow shorelines. Also, we need to hold our government agencies accountable for any damage they may cause. It's not a surprise that while one agency like Texas Parks and Wildlife would be spending millions of dollars to re-plant grass, another agency like the Army Corps of Engineers will issue permits for spoil to be deposited over the grass beds, as recently occurred on the north shore of the bay (you can see this damage on Google Earth, as well as the extent of the current grass beds). Finally, neighborhood dredging projects along west Galveston Island will need to take into account any damage canal dredging may cause, if grass beds have been established nearby.

Enjoy our new ecosystem, and happy fishing along the edges of the grass!
